

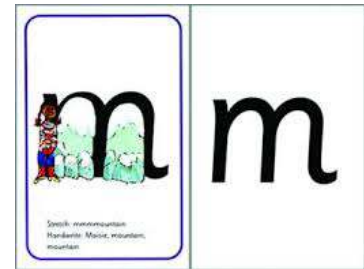

How do we teach Reading?

We start by introducing the Read, Write, Inc. programme:

- learn sounds, each sound has a picture and a phrase to help them remember it.
- blend sounds to read words
- read lots of specially written books featuring all the words they have learned to sound out.



How do we teach Reading?

- 44 sounds are represented by either single letters or groups of letters.
- Learn common exception words e.g. the, went etc.

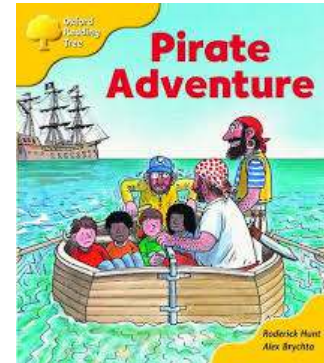

How do we teach Reading?

– Individual reading



– Group/Guided Reading



Reading at home – Early Years



How can you support your child's reading at home?

- Sharing books with your child.
- Reading print in the environment e.g signs, labels etc.
- Discussing the pictures, what is happening in the picture? What is he doing? What is he saying?
- Asking questions about the story e.g. What do you think will happen next? How do you think he feels?

Reading at home – Years 1-2



How can you support your child's reading at home?

- Read little and often
- When they are confident, encourage them to read with expression.
- Talk about what they are reading . Do they understand what is happening in the story?
- Ask questions: What do you think will happen next? Why do you think that? Why did he do that?

Reading at home – Years 3-4



Understanding what they have read is very important.

How can you support your child's reading at home?

- Encourage them to read regularly: books, comics, magazines, books on tablets etc.
- Talk about what they are reading . Do they understand what is happening in the story? Do they understand the vocabulary?
- Ask questions: Why did he do that? How do you know? What words suggest that the character is happy?
- Encourage the children to ask questions about what they are reading.
